Dermatologists to Offer Free Skin Cancer Screenings at TD Waterhouse Cup Tennis Championship

New York Medical Institutions to Conduct Free Skin Screenings During Event

Most Americans still don't know about the early signs of one of the most common types of skin cancer. Left untreated, AK may progress to squamous cell carcinoma, the second leading cause of skin cancer deaths in the United States. At least 40 percent of squamous cell carcinomas begin as AK. Because AK may take years to develop, the condition usually first appears in older people -- although cases have been reported in people in their 40s and 50s.
