"Wandering Eyes" Are Watching; Survey Reveals Laptop Snooping Habits

A survey commissioned in February 2006 by 3M, the makers of privacy filters for laptop computers, uncovered the attitudes and behaviors of business travelers while working on their laptops in public areas, including airports and airplanes. Here are some key findings from this survey (601 business travelers responded with a +/- 4 percent margin of error):

-- Sneaking a peek. Forty-five percent of survey respondents blatantly admit to sneaking glances off others' laptop computer screens while in public spaces.

-- Males vs. females. Male business travelers admit to peeking at other people's laptops 20 percent more often than their female counterparts.

-- What's that? Of those who do peek at others' laptop screens, 42 percent admit to being "interested" in what they see on the screen.

-- Have a look please. Nearly half of those surveyed said they rarely or never do anything to prevent wandering eyes from looking at their laptop screens. The other half employs a combination of methods to prevent snooping: 33 percent turn off their computer, 33 percent shield their screen and most (78 percent) change their seat position.

-- Do you mind? Just over half of the respondents (51 percent) notice others staring at their screens while working in public areas such as airports and coffee shops. Of those 51 percent, over one-fifth had been working on confidential business-related work and 16 percent were working on confidential personal matters.

-- Who needs rules? While 84 percent of business travelers surveyed use their laptop primarily for work, only 4 percent work for companies that regulate business-related work while in public places.

"Every time I'm on an airplane or waiting in an airport, I see business travelers plugging away on their laptops with their screens in clear view of fellow travelers" said travel expert Chris McGinnis, author of "The Unofficial Business Traveler's Pocket Guide: 165 Travel Tips Even the Best Business Travelers May Not Know." "Whether out of sheer boredom or actually being interested in what they see, people do fixate on laptop screens and you never know what they will do with the information they discover. That's why it's always important to protect the data on your screen."
